
419 Ashland Ave. St. Paul, Minnesota

This restoration was hardly the most significant this author ever worked on. In fact, the house was moved to the site it presently occupies, little is known about its history, and it is far from the most elaborate Victorian / Queen Anne house in St. Paul.

The author's role in the project was confined to recreating the frame-and-panel wainscoting surrounding the grand staircase and other details.




With literally thousands of products, it required an imaginative stretch to fit a restored house in a 3M
